Integrated Schools founder Courtney Everts Mykytyn once said, "People like you do things like this." We want to acknowledge that she was talking about White people, and that Integrated Schools' resources were developed with the primary goal of helping White people unlearn assumptions and learn to see and decenter Whiteness. This has left many people of color wondering where/whether they belong here. We are now taking steps to transform Integrated Schools into a multiracial organization. While it will take time for us to expand and evolve, we look forward to generating resources that authentically speak to the specific needs and lived experiences of parents coming to this work from across the spectrum of race and privilege.

## Before you tour...

For those of us who have spent most of our lives in predominantly White spaces, or have been taught to view those spaces as "normal" or more desirable, the physical act of stepping inside a global-majority school can be a first concrete step away from segregation. That said, the whole "school tour" phenomenon tends to cater to parents-as-consumers, fueling our segregationist and opportunity-hoarding impulses. Here are a few thoughts we try to keep in mind when visiting schools:

- We are not tourists or consumers. We try to approach visiting global-majority schools as though we have already decided to enroll our children there, not just to see it, and not to be wooed.
- We pay attention not only to what we see and hear but to our own reactions. We are here as much to learn about ourselves and our relation to the generational work of integration as to learn something about a school.
- We don't come in with a long list of questions. School principals and staff are busy professionals whose time is best spent on educating students, not jumping through hoops to "sell" their school or to give us props for asking the right questions.
- Open heart, open mind. Above all, we enter these spaces with open hearts and open minds as well as
  open eyes. We seek to see each student, teacher, and staff person in their full humanity, just as we do our
  own children.
- Change the conversation. Find at least two things that you really like about the school, and then share those things with your friends. There is great power in the "whisper networks" about schools, and every conversation we have is a chance to change the narrative.
